

The connection between **Hisgalus 13:17** and the Hebrew letter **Tav** (ת) comes from the fact that the Hebrew word for "mark" is literally the name of this letter.

In Scriptural prophecy, this "mark" often represents a seal of ownership or loyalty, with **Tav** serving as HaShem's authentic signature in contrast to the counterfeit mark of the beast.

### **Why the Hebrew Word for "Mark" is "Tav"**

- **Literal Meaning:** The word *tav* in Hebrew (ת) means a **mark, sign, or signature**.
- **Ancient Pictograph:** In its earliest Paleo-Hebrew form, the letter **Tav** was written as two Execution Stakeed sticks, resembling a **Execution Stake** or an "X". This shape was used as a literal "mark" to signify a covenant or an agreement.
- **The Mark of Ezekiel:** Long before Hisgalus, **Ezekiel 9:4** uses this exact word. In that vision, an angel is commanded to put a "mark" (*tav*) on the foreheads of the righteous to protect them from judgment.

### **The Symbolic Clash in Hisgalus**

In the Sefer of Hisgalus, the "mark of the beast" (Hisgalus 13:17) is often seen as a **demonic parody** of HaShem's seal.

Feature	The Mark of HaShem (Tav)	The Mark of the Beast
Scriptural Source	Ezekiel 9:4, Hisgalus 7:3	Hisgalus 13:16-17
Meaning	Truth, covenant faithfulness, and completion	Loyalty to a worldly, anti-HaShem system
Symbolism	The signature of the Creator (Aleph and Tav)	A counterfeit "mark" of ownership by the beast

### The "Aleph and Tav" Connection

When **Yeshua** says, "I am the Alpha and the Omega" in Hisgalus, he is using the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. In a Hebrew context, He is the **Aleph** (א) and the **Tav** (ת).

- **Completion:** As the final letter, **Tav** represents the completion of HaShem's plan and the "seal" of truth (*Emet*).

- **The Execution Stake:** Many Messianic interpretations link the ancient Execution Stake-shaped **Tav** to the crucifixion, viewing it as the ultimate "mark" of salvation that protects believers from judgment.
